Restrictive Language on I-94s issued to Certain Haitians

The purpose of this Letter is to inform ORR grantees and service providers about language that appears on I-94s issued to certain Haitians paroled by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and to advise on proper handling of such cases.

Background

ICE has issued I-94s to certain Haitians that indicate parole, but which also contain the following machine-printed language:

"This form does not convey authorization to receive any type of public benefit."

Discussion

A Haitian with a current or expired parole meets the definition of Haitian Entrant and is eligible for ORR benefits and services the same as a refugee.¹ An I-94 of a Haitian that indicates a current or expired parole is documentary evidence of Haitian Entrant status. The presence on the I-94 of the language cited above does not alter or override ORR's regulations or guidance. **Such language does not invalidate the I-94 indicating parole as documentation nor does it render the paroled Haitian ineligible for ORR benefits and services.**
